We are expecting an encouraging number of registrants at the CAS Annual Meeting, June 24-26. Happily, most delegates have chosen to make the trip and meet in person, our first opportunity to do so at a national level in over 2.5 years. I offer my thanks and congratulations to everyone who has had a hand in creating the Annual Meeting, including the Annual Meeting Working Group chaired by Dr Adriaan Van Rensburg, all the Sections and Chairs for their programming, and our national office staff team, led by Executive Director Debra Thomson. An incredible amount of work has been invested over the past year by a great team to produce a memorable and successful CAS Annual Meeting in beautiful, Halifax, Nova Scotia. Outside of the Annual Meeting, the past 12 months have been productive and eventful for CAS. Our ongoing professional advocacy was a key focus this year. In early 2021, CAS learned that the Ministry of Health in British Columbia had created a plan to introduce independent Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs) as a new health profession and to establish an educational program to train CRNAs in BC. Since CAS learned of the Ministry's intentions, we have been supporting our BC colleagues with their advocacy efforts and in developing a strategy to stop the Ministry from moving closer to including CRNAs in the province. Learn more about what we are doing in our official statement. The second major focus of our advocacy was increasing the engagement between CAS and Family Practice Anesthetist (FPA) colleagues. At our 2021 November Board meeting, CAS passed a resolution committing CAS to further engagement with FPAS. Stay tuned as both situations evolve.

We also announced a successful bid for the World Congress of Anaesthesiologists (WCA), tentatively approved for Vancouver in 2028. The WCA is the preeminent international congress for anaesthesiologists from around the world and provides an extraordinary opportunity for the promotion of science, education, training, networking, and the exchange of experience across the spectrum of anesthesiology. We are looking forward to hosting the world in 2028!

The start of 2022 has also seen a flurry of member discounted education offerings. In March we launched a leadership event, "Keys to Encourage Engagement, Productivity and Combat Burnout". In April, we had the third Neuroanesthesia National Virtual Round, led by the CAS Neuroanesthesia Section. In May, we launched a new CPD Online Module, "Anesthetic Considerations For Endovascular Treatment Of Acute Ischemic Stroke." All of these events were well received and attended. CAS is currently creating an education calendar for the remainder of 2022 and the start of 2023, ensuring that we have something available for members regularly throughout the year. It's an exciting time at CAS, with lots happening!

Throughout the past year, we've had exciting news and updates from several committees, sections and affiliates, many outlined in this newsletter. I encourage you to read about the awesome contributions being made by our members. We also expanded our online presence, by creating **Instagram** and **LinkedIn** organizational accounts. Make sure to follow us on these platforms as well for the latest news and updates.

On a personal note, on September I will be concluding my 2-year term as President of CAS. I would like to thank everyone for their guidance and input during my time as President. I am confident that my colleague and incoming CAS President Dr Lucie Filteau, along with the excellent Board, will continue to expand on the hard work we've accomplished as an organization. ADVOCACY UPDATE

As the national society representing anesthesia professionals in Canada, health human resource planning is of great interest and concern to our organization. As health systems continue to grapple with staff shortages and backlogs due to the pandemic, one of our priorities as an organization is to engage governments on this important issue.

This is a new priority for CAS. While we are proud leaders in the healthcare system, we have not done proactive government engagement at the Society level. In the coming months, we will be embarking on a senior-level meeting program with key officials in major Canadian provinces. During these meetings, we will be focusing on building the profile of CAS and our members, the important role we play in our healthcare system, and how we can provide valuable support and counsel to policymakers as they consider future policies that could impact our profession. As we move forward with these meetings, we will be engaging the leadership of individual provincial associations to supplement our efforts by joining these meetings.

The need for these engagements have become increasingly evident in recent months. Our British Columbia colleagues have been engaging and monitoring local developments that could see the introduction of Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs) within the province – something that we remain gravely concerned about. We are embarking on these activities in part to ensure that we are getting ahead of the issue within other Canadian jurisdictions, and working towards having a "seat at the table" with respect to future policy developments that could affect the domain of anesthesia.

We expect to begin holding these meetings beginning in the summer, and continuing the engagement process into the fall. We will continue to keep our membership apprised of any developments, and look forward to engaging with all of the local associations on this important work.

Hands-on Workshops, including an exciting Patient Safety workshop

The AM workshop format allows you to practise handson skills, improve your technique, and obtain feedback from your peers and instructors. One of the most popular available is "Human-Machine Interactions: Ghost in the Shell or SKYNET? Where Does Anesthesiology Stand in Near-Future Operative Environments?" Attendees will participate in a variety of thought-provoking simulation scenarios addressing concepts around situational awareness in common anesthesia-care locations. Participants will gain an understanding of the differing and distinct levels of situational awareness, individual and team. There are also workshops available in Quality and Patient Safety, Regional Anesthesia and Cardiovascular and Thoracic (CVT).



Test Enhanced Learning (TEL) Sessions

The TEL method uses pre- and post-tests as a form of retrieval practice to aid in long-term knowledge retention. A test containing multiple-choice questions will be sent out about two weeks before and after your selected Annual Meeting session, and the post-test will also provide feedback and references for further learning. By taking these tests in addition to attending the live session, delegates will be able to gain valuable Section 3 CME credits. Furthermore, the speakers will have access to the pre-test results and will be able to better tailor their presentations to meet your learning needs.





ANESTHESIA HISTORY CORNER OUÉBEC'S FIRST FULL-TIME

ANESTHESIOLOGIST: DR CHARLES LAROCQUE (1881-1932)

In the 19th century, Sir William Hingston, Surgeon-in-Chief at the "Hôtel-Dieu de Montréal", was already experimenting with different anesthetic gases. Realizing the safety issues related to anesthesia administered by untrained doctors, he wished to have a full-time anesthesiologist working with him. His dream became true in 1906.

Dr Charles Larocque graduated from « Université Laval à Montréal » in 1905 and interned at the "Hôtel-Dieu de Montréal". In 1906, he decided to become a full-time anesthesiologist, the first in Québec. In 1907, another full-time anesthesiologist, Dr Francis W Nagle, began his career at the Royal Victoria Hospital. These two pioneers established the roots of academic anesthesia in Montreal. Unfortunately, Dr Nagle passed away in 1917.

In 1921, Dr Larocque joined the newly created Canadian Society of Anesthetists and actively participated in the first Annual Meeting in Niagara Falls. Being in close contact with Dr Wesley Bourne, Dr Larocque created links with several anesthesia societies in Canada and the United States. In 1926, he became President of the Canadian Society of Anesthetists and organized the Joint Meeting of the Canadian and Eastern Societies of Anesthetists with the American Society of Regional Anesthesia (ASRA), which took place in Montreal.

During that meeting, he gave a lecture, later published in Anesthesia and Analgesia ⁽¹⁾, on the measurement of blood pressure with the Pachon's oscillometer, which could be seen as the ancestor of our non-invasive blood pressure monitors. Emphasizing the importance of blood pressure measurement, he concluded: "Until a better, ideal, automatic and absolutely accurate method is invented, we must, perforce, content ourselves with the present methods, because the extraordinary clinical and therapeutic evolution brought about by

their systematic use during recent years is sufficient to demonstrate that even now they give to diagnosis and prognosis a real and appreciable aid".

A few years later, with Drs Wesley Bourne and Harold Griffith, he was one of the founders of the Montreal Society of Anesthetists which will be the embryo of our actual Canadian Anesthesiologists' Society. Unfortunately, Dr Charles Larocque passed away in 1932 and therefore could not see the birth of CAS in 1943. His passion for anesthesia and his implication with numerous anesthesia societies was recognized by his local and international colleagues. In October 1932, the International Anesthesia Research Society (IARS) gave a beautiful bronze plaque to the Hôtel-Dieu Hospital in memory of this great pioneer of anesthesia. This plaque was placed at the entrance of the main operating room but, after the closure of the hospital, is now kept in the museum of the Hospitalières nuns.

We should all remember Dr Charles Larocque as one of our giants of Canadian anesthesia!


MEDICATION SAFETY LOTTO: CAN YOU SPOT THE IMPOSTER?





Shortages & back-orders of medication supplies increasingly result in multiple changes to formulations & labelling of medications used in clinical anesthesia care.

This bulletin serves to provide minimum expectation of practicing anesthesiology departments, independent practitioners, pharmacy departments & industry



The reality of current processes of medication delivery is a broken circuit of communication

Our understanding of how our own part of the circuit works is improving

Root Causes:

- Communication: Absence of, Breakdown of
- Drug-Information: Labelling, Ampoule size & colour
- Environment-related: Infrastructure, Tech, Support
- Process-related errors: e.g., look-alike meds stored side by side; information, reporting, feedback

Departmental Aims:

Early identification, Accountability, and Solutions (Based on 2021 CAS Guidelines Statement: (Section 3.1)

- Communication expectations between Anesthesia and Pharmacy
- Ensure robust system of incident reporting & analysis
- Build & Encourage local +/- national data sharing
- Adoption of next-generation solutions such as automation & barcoding

Prevention Strategies:

- A Multidisciplinary team designated for medication safety
- Early identification and communication of shortages, changes in supply chain e.g., drug concentration or lookalike vials
- Adoption of early notification systems related to safety concerns and shortages
- Standardized drug carts with spatial and visual separation of look-alike medications
- Root-cause analysis of identified system errors Identify the breaks in your circle

HOSPITAL CHIEFS OF ANESTHESIA SECTION - WHAT'S NEW

Hospital Chiefs of Anesthesiology The (HCA) Section was formed in 2018. Dr Pascal Labrecque, Dr Colin McCartney and Dr Susan O'Leary shared in the chair duties. Our aim was to create a national anesthesia leadership forum to facilitate communication, sharing of ideas, solutions to problems and more. The 2018 and 2019 in-person meetings generated excellent conversation and collegiality. The 2019 survey of Chiefs of Anesthesia provided direction to the Section. The ideas generated included the following: a national Chief contact list, a generic Chief job description and negotiation strategies, anesthesia department governance and structure, and a discussion forum location on the CAS website.

As the HCA was getting underway, the COVID-19 pandemic interrupted our personal and professional lives. In 2021, we held a virtual session at the CAS Annual Meeting. The open forum focused on the challenges of the pandemic for Chiefs and how to continue to lead effectively in the setting of stress, fatigue and burnout. With that, the original objectives of the HCA will evolve. The next steps will be to re-engage with Anesthesia Chiefs in Canada,

consider the needs for Anesthesia Chiefs in 2022 and determine how we can best serve our colleagues.

The HCA is fortunate to have new co-chairs: Dr Sylvie Aucoin, Dr Mateen Raazi and Dr Robert Doyle will be taking on the leadership of the section. Dr Aucoin is currently the Site Chief for the Department of Anesthesiology and Pain Medicine at The Ottawa Hospital, Civic Campus. Dr. Raazi is a pediatric anesthesiologist in Saskatoon and is the Provincial Head Anesthesiology of Saskatchewan. Dr Robert Doyle currently practises in Kentville, Nova Scotia, and is the Chief of Anesthesia for the Nova Scotia Western Zone. Dr Pascal Labrecque was the driving force for the creation of the Section with Dr McCartney and Dr O'Leary joining in to create this important new group. They are grateful to their successors and see the value of the Section to Anesthesia Chiefs.

We will be meeting in Halifax to talk about one of the biggest problems we are now facing: the anesthesiology staffing shortage. We will also discuss plans for the future of The Hospital Chiefs of Anesthesiology Section.

Regional Anesthesia in the COVID World

While still living in the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, many parts of the world are cautiously optimistic and starting to embrace strategies to live with the virus. Nevertheless, there is a silver lining from this pandemic, which turned our world upside down. Many institutions are taking advantage of regional anesthesia to avoid aerosol-generating procedures for healthcare workers' protection, and increase throughput in the operating room to reduce waitlists. This leads to more appreciation of the benefits associated with regional anesthesia.

A recent international survey across three regional anesthesia societies, led by our very own, Dr Vishal Uppal, the Vice-Chair of the Regional and Acute Pain Section, has shown that given the perceived benefits of regional over general anesthesia, approximately half of the members of three regional anesthesia societies seem to have expanded their use of regional anesthesia techniques during the initial surge of the COVID-19 pandemic.¹

One such example of increased utilization of regional anesthesia is demonstrated by the recent article in the *Canadian Journal of Anesthesia* by Clairoux et al ², which is a retrospective cohort study comparing the prepandemic and inter-pandemic cohorts of patients who underwent breast cancer surgery. In the pre-pandemic group, most surgeries were performed under general anesthesia without any regional anesthesia. On the contrary, in the inter-pandemic group, most patients received paravertebral block with intravenous light sedation during surgery. They found the median time between the end of surgery and readiness for hospital discharge was one hour shorter for those in the interpandemic group.

Chloroprocaine Available in Canada

Since our newsletter last year regarding chloroprocaine, a short-acting local anesthetic mostly used for spinal anesthesia, we are happy to learn that there is a temporary import of US labeled chloroprocaine via Health Canada. It has never been more important

to have an option for short-acting local anesthetic with the increased pressure in fast turnover of cases to reduce surgical backlog stem from the COVID-19 pandemic.

CAS Annual Meeting 2022 - Regional and Acute Pain

Another positive side of the pandemic is embracing technology. Hybrid meetings and webinars have never taken off until the COVID-19 pandemic, which has many advantages. It plays a part in reducing the need to travel for many speakers and delegates with different comfort levels in traveling amid the pandemic, therefore more inclusive. Speakers/delegates from afar are more willing to participate in virtual meetings since it is less costly, less disruptive to their schedule and, at the same time, reduces the carbon footprint. We are extremely grateful that CAS has listened to its members and will be holding a hybrid meeting.

At the upcoming CAS Annual Meeting, our Section has both in-person sessions and virtual sessions with an excellent and diverse panel of faculty from both east and west Canada, as well as from the USA. We will start off with the hybrid session on the latest in perioperative pain management, followed by an inperson problem-based session to discuss one of the most challenging cases of medication treatment of opioid use disorder patients.

Another hybrid session will be the "New Frontiers for practising anesthesiologists in regional anesthesia". This session is tailored for anesthesiologists who already incorporate regional anesthesia in their practice on how you can take your regional anesthesia expertise to the next level – whether it is acquiring new techniques, or establishing a new regional anesthesia program in your institution. Finally, if you find the nomenclatures of the fascial plane blocks hard to keep up, the hybrid session of "Decoding the alphabet soup" will be for you. During this session, we will review many of the latest fascial plane blocks, as well as a pro/con debate on the utilization of ESP block for surgeries of the chest.

We have our interactive "Ask the expert" panel session on Saturday, June 25 where you can ask about anything and everything related to regional anesthesia and acute pain medicine. Bronchial Blockers and Lung Isolation Workshop: Sunday, June 26, 10:00 am AT

A fun crew from around the country will help you get better at those tricky one lung ventilation situations that we occasionally have to deal with. This session will go over the options for providing lung isolation with modern lung isolation/separation devices, including right and left DLTs, the Fuji Uniblocker, Arndt Blocker, Cohen Flexitip Blocker and EZ Blocker. Participants will be observed practising their insertion technique with these devices on mannequins. Emphasis will be placed on the management of lung isolation in a patient with a difficult airway. Common problems encountered during lung isolation will also be discussed with a quick review of endoscopic bronchial anatomy.

PBLD: Problem-Based Learning Discussion: Saturday, June 25 and Sunday, June 26 various times


