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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear colleagues,

As we approach the end of the 2022, it's worth pausing and reflecting on the year that it's been. The pandemic continues to have its impact on our workplaces and our lives. We face frequent equipment/ medication shortages and staffing shortages from almost every member of the healthcare team. Patients are having incredible difficulty accessing medical/surgical care and we are, at the very least, witness to this and, in many circumstances, directly impacted ourselves. As a result, we face enormous productivity pressure while lacking sufficient resources. We feel frustration, exhaustion, burnout and moral injury. Our need to look out for ourselves and each other has never been greater. A strong anesthesia community is key in tackling these challenging times.

It's an honour to be at the helm of our Canadian anesthesia community and to be able to play a role in supporting my colleagues across the country. I want to acknowledge those who have committed time and effort over the past year to developing educational content for our members, both for the Annual Meeting and our Webinars/CPD Modules throughout the year. Event planning for the June 2023 Annual Meeting in Quebec City is well under way and I'm optimistic that you will find the planned content both relevant and worthwhile. We are also planning to enhance your learning opportunities throughout the year. One such example is the initiation of an Amazing Rounds series, where anesthesia departments submit their top grand rounds of the year, to be shared nationally. We will be working out the logistics over the next few months so keep an eye open for announcements in the new year. This newsletter highlights other initiatives led by our committees, sections and other volunteers, for which we are eternally grateful. I recommend that you read through the entire issue to be informed and to draw inspiration from their hard work.

Our new Chief Executive Officer, Vanessa Foran, joined us in early October and she has been spending the last 2.5 months getting to know everything about our organization and the people in it, all the while hitting the ground running! I'm excited about the wealth of experience and new ideas that she brings to the table. You can read more about Vanessa in our **September newsletter**.

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With the guidance of our government relations firm, Global Public Affairs, Vanessa and I have started to reach out to certain provincial government health leaders to discuss viable strategies to address the anesthesia shortage and surgical backlog. While the suitability of certain initiatives may vary from province to province, one thing is universal: anesthesia needs to be at the table to provide valuable insight for perioperative healthcare reform. Throughout 2023, we will continue to partner with your provincial anesthesia representatives during our government advocacy efforts.

One thing that will be loud and clear in our messaging is that major conduct anesthesia (deep sedation, general/ neuraxial anesthesia) is a medical act that must be directly administered by a physician. Anesthesia delivery models that propose having an anesthesiologist simultaneously supervise more than one O.R. for major conduct anesthesia is not in keeping with our CAS Guidelines. This type of practice sends a clear message to hospitals and governments that our direct presence is not necessary for safe/quality patient care and, as such, will not be supported nor promoted. This issue was discussed at length at our November Board meeting and your provincial representatives were in strong agreement that physician anesthesia providers should be assisted but not replaced by other members of the health care team. I encourage you all to uphold our Canadian quality of care standards in the face of enormous pressure to do otherwise, by those who underestimate the complexities of anesthesia care.

Our national office has been hard at work transitioning to a new membership portal to better serve you and the organization. Membership renewal notices are being sent out in phases to tweak the process. Keep an eye on your inboxes! Thank you to those who have already renewed. None of our educational events or advocacy efforts would be possible without your membership.

CASIEF: Advancing Safe Surgery and Anesthesia Worldwide By: Amy Liu

For three decades, the Canadian Anesthesiologists' Society International Education Foundation (CASIEF) has worked to make safe anesthesia and perioperative care a reality for millions internationally. Founded in 1993, CASIEF has partnered with five nations to bring anesthesia education to regions in need, training over 500 anesthesiologists and now boasting a network of over 100 incredible volunteers.

CASIEF's predecessor, the CAS Training and Relief Fund, was created in 1964 after the World Federation of Societies of Anaesthesiologists (WFSA) issued a call to help make modern anesthesia advances more available internationally. This fund's objectives were to bring international medical learners to Canada for training and to aid in the establishment of local anesthesiology training in other countries.^{1,2}

The year 1985 marked the beginning of the CAS Training and Relief Fund's support of an ongoing collaboration between the Nepalese Tribhuvan University's Institute of Medicine and the University of Calgary, to increase Nepal's anesthesiologist workforce from 7 to the World Health Organization's recommendation of 27 for its population of 16 million.³ Dr Roger Maltby led the Canadian coordination of this program, providing academic support and administrative guidance. In January 1985, the Tribhuvan University one-year Diploma of Anesthesia (DA) program was started for physicians desiring or requiring anesthesia training.¹ Under the DA program, Nepalese anesthesia services were able to expand to ten hospitals beyond the Kathmandu valley.¹ In 1992, given the success of the DA program, planning began for creating a home-grown anesthesiology residency program. After feasibility studies were conducted and extensive curriculum planning was completed, the Tribhuvan University anesthesiology residency program kicked off in 1996.¹

Meanwhile, the CAS Training and Relief Fund underwent a rebranding process. One of its original two missions - training international physicians within Canada - had garnered political pushback and led to dwindling support for the Fund.⁴ In light of its recent integral contributions to the Nepal program's successes, the Fund tactically pivoted to emphasizing its other mission of helping to establish anesthesia education internationally and accordingly renamed itself the CAS International Education Fund (CASIEF).⁴ With the new Society name came the refocusing of CASIEF's objectives - to help establish safe, modern anesthesia practices in regions of the world with limited access to it by facilitating knowledge translation and establishing educational facilities. By 2005, CASIEF could proudly boast of having aided 21 Nepalese candidates in graduating from their own, now self-sufficient, national anesthesiology residency program,¹ further underlining the organization's ability to establish successful educational frameworks for teaching anesthesia. CASIEF became recognized internationally for its methodology in implementation of an excellent anesthesiology educational model. As such, Dr Angela Enright, CASIEF Chair (2004-2008), fittingly renamed the CAS International Education Fund into the CAS International Education Foundation, as it is called today.⁵

In 2003, the WFSA requested CAS and CASIEF's aid in establishing a Rwandan Anesthesia Program on behalf of the Rwandan Ministry of Health and the National University of Rwanda (NUR). The country was still recovering from its devastating genocide of 1994 and, at that time, had a single anesthesiologist, with assistance from six expatriate anesthesiologists working on periodic contracts.⁶ In fact, a large proportion of anesthesia care was provided by nurses who lacked any formal specialized training, though there was at least a burgeoning and robust program of anesthesia technicians.⁷

Dr Angela Enright conducted a feasibility study as to whether an anesthesiology program could be established in Rwanda as had been done in Nepal, and the findings were encouraging.⁶ By 2006, CASIEF and Rwanda had a memorandum of understanding, agreeing on how establishment of the program would proceed.⁵ The American Society of Anesthesiologists (ASA) was another active partner in helping establish the program in Rwanda. The first volunteer was sent within the year.

Dr Patty Livingston played a core role in developing the Rwandan program; she helped set it on a sure path to

success by assisting CASIEF's partners in building not only the main curriculum but also the simulation center, among other special programs.⁷ With continued support from CASIEF and ASA, the Rwandan program has become progressively closer to self-sufficiency over the years. Although retention of anesthesiology graduates is a tangible challenge, Rwanda now has about forty excellent anesthesiologists of their own.⁵

In similar fashion, CASIEF has continued to aid other countries, with a past program in Palestine and current ones in Ethiopia, Guyana, and Burkina Faso.^{8,9} The development of anesthesia education in each country posed unique challenges in terms of resource availability, political support for physicianled anesthesia models, and difficulties attracting and retaining interest within the specialty.7 CASIEF has sought to address each of these challenges in innovative ways. For instance, when the Palestine program came to face funding difficulties from its initial backer-the United Arab Emirates-CASIEF helped establish support from the WFSA which secured new financial backing from the International Medical Education Trust and took responsibility for the program in later years.⁹ Furthermore, many settings lack important anesthetic equipment, such as pulse oximeters. In partnership with the Lifebox Foundation, CASIEF was able to almost completely furnish Nepal, Rwanda, and Burkina Faso with costeffective pulse oximeters.¹⁰ Opinions among policymakers and healthcare providers throughout Sub-Saharan African are also slowly shifting positively, with more understanding of the importance of surgical and anesthetic safety. CASIEF has played a major role in this shift. Its work raises awareness that there is no safe surgery without safe anesthesia; indeed, more people die from lack of access to safe surgery and anesthesia than from malaria, AIDS and tuberculosis combined.⁵ Advocating for and informing governments and healthcare systems on the importance of anesthesiaspecific training has led to, for instance, the implementation of financial incentives and residency application policies that encourage medical students to apply for anesthesia.^{5,7}

CASIEF has since continued to extend its anesthesia capacity-building mission to other countries requesting its services. The program has successfully supported the development of independent anesthesia programs in Nepal and Rwanda, with major steps being made currently in Ethiopia, Guyana, and Burkina Faso. CASIEF is financed by generous donations from CAS members with the funding being used to sponsor volunteers who generally spend a month's time in those countries to teach local anesthesiology residents and other interested healthcare staff. Canadian residents are also welcome volunteers who have developed peer relationships with local trainees during in-country education activities,⁶ supported virtual education programs, and aided with fundraising.

CASIEF, now approaching its 30-year anniversary of founding, has been, and continues to be, an exemplary model for establishing anesthesiology partnerships around the world!

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PERIOPERATIVE SECTION – SURGICAL PROGRESSIVE CARE UNIT AT HEALTH SCIENCES CENTRE IN WINNIPEG

The Surgical Progressive Care Unit at Health Sciences Centre in Winnipeg, Manitoba has been in operation since 2009. It is an 8-bed high dependency unit for perioperative patients who would otherwise utilise ICU level services. The unit is jointly run by the unit nursing staff and 14 attending anesthesiologists with expertise in perioperative medicine. Admitting surgeons work alongside the attending anesthesiologist to provide care for the complex patients admitted to our unit.

The bulk of admitted patients has undergone procedures such as open abdominal aortic aneurysm repair, large liver resections, hyperthermic intraperitoneal chemotherapy procedure, esophagectomy, pneumonectomy, and whipple procedure. ICU patients who are no longer intubated but not yet ready for the ward are also routinely admitted for "step down" stays. The Surgical progressive care unit provides limited critical care services such as low dose vasopressors, IV cardiac medications including amiodarone, and non-invasive positive pressure ventilation. Enhanced monitoring is provided through a 2:1 nursing model, 24 hour telemetry, and capacity for invasive blood pressure and continuous central venous pressure monitoring. Internal data collection suggests that the existence of our unit reduces ICU requirements by one full bed space based on local ICU admission practices.

Anesthesiologist involvement in this unit has greatly enhanced the practice of perioperative medicine and critical care across the entire department of anesthesia at HSC. Patients benefit from this expertise by following safer and more appropriate perioperative pathways.



OBSTETRIC SECTION – GREETINGS AND UPDATES

Greetings from the Obstetrics Section! The Obstetric Section is one of the largest sections in the CAS and includes around 150 members annually. We are pleased to welcome Dr Anton Chau from Vancouver, BC on the Obstetrics section Executive as our new Secretary/Treasurer!



The CAS Annual Meeting in Halifax 2022 was a great success. The Obstetrics Section executive wishes to thank our presenters, moderators, and award winners for contributing to its realisation. The Best Paper in Obstetric Anesthesia for Anesthesiologists (\$1,000) "Spontaneous and oxytocin-induced contractility after exposure to intravenous anesthetic agents: an in-vitro study in human myometrium" was awarded to Dr Natalia Portela from Mount Sinai Hospital in Toronto, Ontario. The Best Paper in Obstetric Anesthesia for residents and medical students (\$500) "A Retrospective Cohort Study Comparing Catheter Replacement Rates with Programmed Intermittent Epidural Bolus and Continuous Epidural Infusion" was awarded to Dr Brendan Morgan from IWK Health Centre in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

We are calling for eligible investigators to submit an application for the CAS Obstetric Anesthesia Research Grant. The Executive committee has worked with CARF to offer this grant with the intention to support research that would advance the understanding of science and clinical practice in obstetric anesthesiology. Up to \$20,000 maximum will be awarded to a research proposal that is directly related to the Obstetrics Section's goal of promoting and disseminating evidence-based research on obstetric anesthesia. Teaching!

Thanks to the dedication or our volunteers and generosity of our donors, CASIEF is ramping up its in-person visits to our partner countries, Rwanda, Ethiopia and Guyana. While we continued close communication and virtual teaching sessions in all of our programs during the pandemic, it became ever more clear that there is no substitute for faceto-face teaching and support.

CASIEF Featured at All Africa Anesthesia Congress

The 2022 All Africa Anesthesia Congress, held in September in Kigali, showcased Rwanda to delegates from all over Africa and the world. CASIEF was well represented, and numerous presentations, workshops and courses were given by CASIEF volunteers. We also had the opportunity to discuss the importance of sustainability with high-ranking officials of the Ministry of Health, to advocate for ways to improve retention of the limited number of anesthesiologists in the country. Rwanda remains a popular program for our teaching volunteers, and trips have been scheduled into 2024.

Focus on Ethiopia

Our two partnerships in Ethiopia are growing by leaps and bounds, with almost 80 residents in the three-year Addis Ababa program and less than a dozen faculty to teach them! Similarly, our newest partnership with Haramaya University is in its second year—with eight residents being accepted per year and four teaching faculty, our help is needed more than ever. The first visit by a CASIEF volunteer to Haramaya took place in September, and reaffirmed their appreciation of our partnership. Similarly, we have kept up close support of our only non-African partnership, Guyana, and are ramping up volunteer visits over the coming year.

Anesthesia Machine fun-raising campaign!

As many delegates at the CAS meeting in Halifax are aware, we have partnered with Dr Lucie Filteau, our CAS President, on a unique initiative that will help support CASIEF's important international work. 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
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
