CONGRESS OF ANAESTHETISTS - LONDON AND PARIS

Canada was adequately represented at the XXVI Congress of Anaesthetists held in London, England, September 3-7, 1951; and at the Congrès International d'Anesthésiologie in Paris, France, September 20-22, 1951. Among Canadians attending were Dr. & Mrs. Georges Cousineau, Dr. & Mrs. Moise Clermont, Dr. & Mrs. Harold Griffith, Dr. & Mrs. Maurice Legare, Dr. & Mrs. L. Ostiguy, all of Montreal, Dr. C. Arthur Sheridan of Sarnia; Dr. Marjory Bennett and Dr. Donalda Huggins of Winnipeg; Dr. Dorothy Barnhouse of Edmonton; and Professor J. H. Quastel of McGill University. Canadians now residing in the United States included Dr. & Mrs. W. G. Mackensie of Detroit; Dr. & Mrs. J. G. Cleland of Oregon City; Dr. A. W. Friend of Akron; Dr. Ralph Tovell of Hartford.

The London Congress was sponsored by the International Anaesthesia Research Society and by the Association of Anaesthetists of Great Britain and Ireland, and was a great success. More than 450 anaesthetists from 26 countries were in attendance. The Joint Presidents of the Congress were Dr. Ivan Magill of London, and Dr. Harold Griffith of Montreal. Dr. Cousineau conveyed official greatings from the Canadian Anaesthetists' Society. Forty-six important scientific papers were presented during the sessions which were held in British Medical Association House, Tavistock Square; there was a very large Commercial and Scientific Exhibit in St. Pancras Town Hall; and clinical sessions were conducted in most of the London teaching hospitals. A series of social functions including receptions at the Royal Society of Medicine, the Royal College of Surgeons, and the Royal College of Physicians, emphasized the present high status of British anaesthetists. A formal dinner was held in the impressive setting of the Grand Hall of Lincoln's Inn, where many of the best known figures in British medicine graced the long head table. On this occasion Dr. Griffith responded to the toast to the Guests, and presented "Scrolls of Recognition" on behalf of the I.A.R.S. to Dr. A.D. Marston, Dean of the Faculty of Anaesthetists of the Royal College of Surgeons; Dr. R.R. Macintosh, Nuffield Professor of Anaesthetics at Oxford University; and Dr. I.W. Magill, world-famous anaesthetist of London. The Congress was concluded by a most enjoyable dinner dance at the Dorchester Hotel, where Dr. & Mrs. Griffith received more than 400 guests.

Following the London Congress a party of thirty North American Anaesthetists visited Anaesthesia teaching centres throughout England and Scotland. They were entertained by Lord Nuffield and Professor Macintosh at Oxford, by Dr. Featherstone at Birmingham, by Dr. Cecil Gray at Liverpool, by Dr. John Gillies in Edinburgh, by Drs. Brennan, Hunter and others in Manchester, and by Professor Pask at Newcastle-upon-Tyne. Everywhere they found good clinical

anaesthesia and enthusiastic interest in teaching programs.

The Congress in Paris was organized by the Société Francaise d'Anesthésie, under the direction of Professeur Robert Monod and Dr. Marcel Thalheimer, and attracted delegates from many countries, including surgeons and others interested in anaesthesiology. The sessions were held in the Hospice de la Salpétrière, and all arrangements were most elaborately organized. The rather crowded scientific program was not of the same calibre as the London Congress, but the social and gastronomic features were very good indeed. Dr.Cousineau acted as spokesman for the guests on numerous occasions, and his address at the reception in the Hôtel de Ville given by the Conseil Municipal de Paris was outstanding. A highlight of the Congress was the visit to Moet and Chandon champagne caves at Epernay and the "Dejeuner Champenois" which followed.

There was considerable discussion at the Congress regarding a proposal to organize a representative international Anesthesiology Society. American and British delegates insisted that such a society must be controlled by anesthesiologists and Dr. Cousineau ably directed the discussion which sometimes became heated. Finally all arguments were amicably resolved, and plans for proceeding with the organization of an international society and for an international congress to be held in 1954 were left to a small interim Committee, of which all the members are practising anaesthesiologists. Committee members are – Dr. Harold Griffith, Montreal, Chairman; Dr. John Gillies, Edinburgh; Dr. Torsten Gordh, Stockholm; Dr. A. Goldblat, Brussels; and Dr. Jacques Boureau, Paris. It is hoped to hold the first meeting of the Committee in Canada in 1952.

NEW BRUNSWICK MEETING

On Sept. 6th and 7th last, on the invitation of the New Brunswick Division, your immediate past president was very happy to attend the Annual meeting of the Provincial Medical Society at St. Andrews. Although the plane was several hours late, not arriving until near midnight, he was very kindly met at Penfield Ridge by Dr. Eli Davis and driven the twenty-eight miles to the Algonquin Hotel.

Anaesthesiology in New Brunswick is confronted with two problems which are peculiar to that province and fortunately each obtains in only one place. In one, nurse anaesthetists have become established, apparently due to a loophole in the medical act which allows a physician, so I am told, to nominally head a department of anaesthesia, although he is not actively connected with it, and the hospital to employ nurse anaesthetists. This of course is entirely contrary to our concepts of the best interests of the patient both medically and financially.

The other is a more peculiar one and also tends to prevent the proper development of the specialty. In this centre the anaesthetist is discouraged by the surgeons in rendering his own account but must depend on the surgeon for payment of his fee out of an overall surgical fee.

It was with these conditions in mind that your representative spoke after luncheon to the Society on the growth of the Specialty of Anaesthesia and the various types of anaesthetic practice from the economic standpoint. Dr. Ned Lunney in his motion of a vote of thanks very ably pointed up some of the speaker's remarks. It is to be hoped that this propoganda will bear fruit.

A paper was also given in the scientific session on the dangers of hypoxia with the newer anaesthetic agents.

The meeting as a whole seemed to be a huge success and the outstanding thing was the friendliness and good will shown by all the members of the N.B. Medical Society. Your speaker is especially grateful to the Executive of the N.B. Division, Dr. Slater of St. John and Dr. Stewart, local practitioner in St. Andrews, for their delightful hospitality.

This was the second time that an anaesthetist has appeared as a guest speaker at the Annual Meeting of the N.B. Medical Society and it is to be hoped that it will occur frequently.
